

WHAT ISSUES AND FORMAL HORIZONS HAVE BEEN OPENED UP BY THE PRACTICE OF CERAMICS AND SCULPTURE IN GENERAL, WHERE PAINTING FOUND ITS LIMITS?

Sculpture allows me to explore forms in a much more intuitive, physical way. First of all, I work with my hands, without tools, drawing strength from my whole body. I often work standing up, bent over, with the strength of my arms and back, to stretch or compress the material, to build, to fuse, to rough up the clay to draw shapes in volume and build solid walls.

Then it becomes the work of an architect, that of drawing façades: from the creation of details, with slip, I engage in a reflection on matter, texture, ornament, maximalism, hairs, flowers, teeth... it's no longer a question of figuring a garden on a canvas but of making organic and alive what was only a tat of earth.

Thinking in volume allows me to think of an object, a figure, a gargoyle in space, in the environment. Its future interactions with light, its inclusion in reality and the way in which we can turn around it and see very different things depending on each shot, each angle of view.

This is quite the opposite of painting, which encourages flat, fixed reflection and figurative, static interactions between several elements. In sculpture, the dialogue is uncertain and constantly evolving. Depending on the scenography, etc., the focus is less on a scene as a whole than on the creation of a character, a unique symbol to be released into nature. Grotesque references, Gothic architecture, dialogue between the monstrous and the marvelous, design character, observation of nature and animals, trompe I'œil, and a shift from the mineral (earth, glass) to the supposedly organic: imitation of a flower, a beast, a limb...).

Playing with scale (tiny or gigantic), density: figuring lightness when the material is so heavy, playing with colors and effects (metal, lustre...).

Sculpture is a new way for me to approach figuration,





DID YOUR CHILDHOOD INFLUENCE YOUR ART?


As a kid I can't really say I had a major art influence, but during my young adult life I was introduced to the urban art and that was really a door opened on so much more influences that came into my life later!

I don't really need to be asked some questions about me or my artwork, I am more interested on what my work convey as emotions or feelings to others.


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Max Weiss uses airbrushes to create a digital look, enlivened by elements in oil and different materials. Using an ironic approach, he confronts the characters of Larry and Gina with the unpleasant events that mark their daily lives.

Fears and worries such as relationship problems, rejection, loneliness and material difficulties need to have a lightness about them that allows the viewer to reflect on them without falling into negative thoughts. By working with photographs, the images always have a link with the real world. The characters in the paintings are depicted as a kind of doll that only come to life through their eyes.

WHICH ART SCHOOL DID YOU ATTEND?


I attended Syracuse University, School of Visual and performing Arts

YOUR FAVORITE SONG?



Loser Angeles is a visual artist based in Los Angeles, CA.

Using a variety of mediums, Loser Angeles' work features common subjects and characters spontaneously throughout his works — which explore and emphasize what he describes as "the oddness of the ordinary."

Loser Angeles draws heavy influence from the absurd and non-sensical and creates work that challenges the viewer, or who he prefers to describe as "the participant" to abandon all recognition of meaning. His frequent use of bright and primary colors, bold graphics and text in his work are inspired by the primitive desire to see harmony in discord

Il mêle aplat, transparence ou jeux de superposition pour structurer sa composition. Les formes sont simplifiées, géométriques et les lignes marquées. L'intensité chromatique est accentuée. On perçoit une digitalisation de la peinture dans le traité graphique de ses œuvres.

Il peint principalement des paysages ou des scènes de la vie quotidienne. L'univers de Blandin est coloré, immersif et contemplatif en suspens dans le temps entre rêve et réalité. Avec un regard aiguisé pour les détails, il révèle le charme caché du banal, nous rappelant que la beauté peut se trouver dans les choses les plus simples. À travers son art, il nous invite à réveiller nos sens et à apprécier les merveilles de notre quotidien.

Les sujets de mes peintures - les objets réalité еt 1e monde l'imagination - sont restés très proches de moi et continuent d'influencer mon travail. En effet, lors de mes premières expériences avec la peinture, commencé à comprendre le sens de cette forme d'art et à apprécier la visuelle beauté que mes créations véhiculaient. Au lieu de dessiner, j'ai commencé à créer des peintures! Depuis l'école primaire, je préfère le autres matières aux souvent représenté l'école dans des Pendant concours de dessin. mes études à la High School of Fine Arts (1992 - 1995)

, j'ai peint pour la première fois un objet – une paire de chaussures – avec une figure du peuple Mentawai. Le peuple Mentawai est une tribu indigène qui ne porte pas de chaussures. Le fait de voir le tableau m'a procuré un grand sentiment de satisfaction. C'est peut-être là que la fusion de la réalité et de l'imagination a commencé à prendre forme en tant qu'expression personnelle. Même si je ne connaissais pas le surréalisme en peinture à l'époque, cette période a marqué le début de mon voyage dans la peinture. Au cours de cette phase, j'ai également commencé à peindre des personnages de poupées aux grands yeux.

Les sujets de mes peintures, qui mêlent la réalité au domaine de l'imagination, sont restés partie intégrante de mon travail et continuent de m'influencer. En effet, c'est au cours de ces premières expériences de peinture que j'ai commencé à saisir l'essence de l'art et à apprécier la beauté visuelle que mes créations véhiculaient. Plutôt que de dessiner, j'ai commencé à créer des tableaux!

Je cherche à transformer les « faits de la réalité » en expressions émotionnelles et imaginatives, conférant ainsi à mon travail un caractère personnalisé. C'est un processus exaltant. C'est pourquoi je considère mon atelier de peinture comme un laboratoire miniature.



Toxic, recognized as one of the pioneers of street art in the '80s, will present paintings still influenced by lettering, sometimes pushed to the point of abstraction. He delivers a complex, colorful universe of symbols and tags. His mastery of color remains intact and clearly recognizable.

In collaboration with photographer Fred Atax, photos of Haiti reworked with spray paint will also be presented, along with drawings, to show the full range of his current work

Born in 1965 in the South Bronx, American Torrick Ablack, of Caribbean origin, is one of the precursors of the Graffiti movement of the 80s. Growing up in the Bronx, Toxic began graffitiing trains and walls in New York at the age of 13, alongside his friends.

A fellow traveler of Jean-Michel Basquiat, he formed the Hollywood Africans group with Basquiat and Rammelzee, named after a famous Basquiat painting.

Toxic will appear in three of Basquiat's works. The best-known, made in 1984, shows him in full-length and bears his name "Toxic"; this work is exhibited at the Whitney Museum.

In the 80s, he exhibited regularly in New York at the famous Fashion Moda Gallery and at Sidney Janis. Over the past 30 years, his talent and success with a discerning public have never wavered. His work is exhibited throughout Europe.

In 2006, the Brooklyn Museum paid homage to the precursors of the graffiti movement, consecrating Toxic as a major artist alongside such legends as NOC 167 and Bear 167.

Today, he is recognized as one of the great masters who took street art to the heights of contemporary art.

HUGO BAUD

Hugo Baudouin is a France-based artist whose paintings have been exhibited nationally, as well as in the USA, Germany and the UK. His figurative works translate what's hidden inside, revealing social iconography, sexuality and aesthetic fantasy. Through his art, Baudouin aims to confront the viewer with his own individuality. He creates using a combination of oils, acrylics and spray paint.
